


The H180 Program is an afterschool an in-school program to help students both academically and behaviorally

- The H180 uses curriculum which is based on social emotional learning to teach life skills
- Classes are providing tutoring/homework time, then Curriculum
- The students are provided prosocial activities
- Students are given an opportunity to come back as volunteers and peer mentors as Torch Bearers

The H180 Program is a Partnership

- The H180 program is a collaboration and partnership of the students support system to help support and encourage their positive development.
- A program facilitator works closely with all the student's support system and making sure everyone works together to support the student.

 - Handle interpersonal situations effectively








Girls Circle® is the FIRST gender-responsive program in the country to demonstrate effectiveness in reducing delinquency ... Now listed on SAMHSA's National Registry of Evidence-based Programs.

 The Girls Circle® model, a structured support group for girls and youth who identify with female development from 9-18 years, integrates relational theory, resiliency practices, and skills training in a specific format designed to increase positive connection, personal and collective strengths, and competence.



Unity Circle[™] is a structured support group model for people of all genders that addresses critical needs and strengths while honoring and celebrating the unique lived experiences of circle participants.

Rooted in diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) principles, it aims to boldly counteract racial and social forces that impede growth and development in all types of environments. One Circle Foundation acknowledges and explores the complex ways in which race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, culture, and gender intersect and shape, impede and/or strengthen the relational experiences and dimensions of adolescent development.

Who is eligible for our Services?

Justice-Involved


- Youth and families who have come in
- contact with the justice system are eligible to enter our programming at no cost. Whether the youth or a member of the household, justice system involvement would qualify all to participate.

DCF or CINC

- Youth and families that are involved with a
- DCF or CINC case would automatically qualify for services at no cost. Whether youth are in foster care, or the family is engaged in a CINC case, all would be able to engage in our programming.

<u>Mental/Behavioral</u> <u>Health</u>

A new mental/behavioral health crisis would allow for youth and their families to engage with our programming. This referral could come from any of the professionals in a youth's life, and would allow for the youth and their family to receive services at no cost to foster support for all who are working through the crisis.
